The Wildlife-Vehicle Accident Prevention Program reminds drivers that spring is a high-risk time for wildlife-vehicle collisions. Wildlife are attracted to roadsides in the spring for several reasons. Residual roadside salt deposits, left after snowmelt, attract wildlife to the roadside. Also, early vegetation growth in roadside ditches leads to an increased wildlife presence near the road.

WVAPP "Hints for the Highway" while driving this spring are:

- > Slow Down and obey all posted signs collision avoidance is improved at lower speeds.
- Drive Defensively watch out between dusk and dawn.
- > Be Alert animals are unpredictable, often travel in groups, and may bolt unexpectedly.
- ➤ Use Your Vehicle clean your headlights, use your high beams when safe to do so, and always wear your seatbelt.
